Extending the growing season

- Practices range from temporary to permanent, inexpensive to costly
 - O Row cover/cover cloth
 - Low tunnel
 - High tunnel or greenhouse

A starting point: row cover

- Spun polyester agricultural fabric
 - Comes in several thicknesses
 - Can be used for several/many seasons
 - Provides 1-3 degrees of frost protection
- Brands: Reemay, Agribon
- Local source: A.M. Leonard in Piqua







Row cover (cont.)

- Support cloth with hoops
 - Allows for ventilation
 - Purchase or make from coiled9 gauge galvanized steel wire
 - Works well with 4-5' wide beds
 - Space 3' apart
- Bury edges of cloth
 - Keep cloth in place
 - Clips, pins not necessary









Seed saving example: Tomatoes

Self-pollinating

- Most modern varieties cannot cross-pollinate
- Potato-leafed varieties, beefsteaks, and currant tomatoes are susceptible to cross-pollination
- If more than one potato leaf tomato (e.g., Brandywine) is grown, flowers need bagged
- o If a beefsteak produces a double fruit, do not save seed from it

Seed saving example: Tomatoes (cont.)

Harvest

- Pick and wash fully ripe tomatoes
- Cut the fruit through the middle to expose the seed cavity
- Squeeze the seeds and surrounding gel into a container
- Add water (optional), it may make separating mold from seeds easier

Allow gel to ferment for 1-3 days

- Be cautious where you leave the bowl; it'll get funky
- Each tomato seed is encased in a gelatinous sack that inhibits germination
- Fermentation breaks down the germination inhibitor







Seed saving example: Tomatoes (cont.)

Clean the seed

- Skim the mold off
- o Add water and stir. Pour pulp and immature seeds off.
- Repeat
- Use a strainer as necessary
- o Dry the seeds on a plate, stir to keep from clumping
- Store
 - o Cool, dry area in an airtight container





Seed drying & storage

To check for seed dryness

- Try to bend seed in half
- If it breaks, it is dry enough for store
- If it bends, continue drying

Seed storage

- In an airtight container
- In a dark, cool place
- Avoid high-humidity or swings in humidity



Cover crops

Benefits

- Suppress weeds
- Provide soil organic matter
- Help nutrient retention
- Feed microbes in your garden outside of main cropping season

Consider

- Time of seeding
 - **▼** Most cover crops need seeded by Sept. 15
 - **x** Cereal rye can be seeded later
- Type of kill
 - Winter kill (cold) or spring kill (tillage)



Cover crop seed for sale

- Sold by Darke SWCD
- \$3 per pound
- 2 mixes available:
 - Winter mix
 - Cereal rye & radish blend
 - × Covers 700 sq. ft.
 - ▼ Cereal rye overwinters
 - Fall mix
 - Oat & radish blend
 - × Covers 640 sq. ft.
 - × Both cover crops winter kill
